### **About the Festival**

The second Cycle Arts Festival presented a unique outdoor site specific mixed arts programme created for the Paisley to Lochwinnoch Cycle Route. The Festival was developed by Place Partnership at OneRen in collaboration with a range of Renfrewshire organisations, local artists and Sustrans. The idea was to push boundaries of creativity in linking an array of artists of mixed practice with Renfrewshire's unique biodiversity and environments and the enjoyment of cycling.

Commissioned artists working in various media presented site specific creative interventions tied to places along the cycle path routes working in collaboration with the local communities.

Using interesting buildings, views and unusual locations the festival delivered a narrative of place for Renfrewshire linking to ideas of environmental sustainability, wellbeing, embedded local cultures, history of place, cycling and social change.





### **Aims of the Festival**

- To increase the use and value of Renfrewshire Cycle Routes by the wider public linking communities in Paisley, Johnstone, Elderslie, Kilbarchan and Lochwinnoch.
- To develop a strategic arts event which both delivers innovative outdoor arts experiences and promotes health and wellbeing in Renfrewshire, encouraging cycling for wellbeing.
- Push boundaries of creativity in linking Arts and Cycling to Renfrewshire's unique biodiversity.
- Change perceptions and understanding of environmental actions and the climate emergency.
- Event established as key event in the calendar with multiple partners supporting its future development.
- Quality of Artistic Output recognised as critical to the success of the event achieving against step change "Cultural Excellence"

# Festival Events

### Outdoor Arts Commissions for the Cycle Arts Festival

#### Pigeons, Patter and Pathways

*Pigeons, Patter and Pathways* is a participatory art project presenting uplifting poetry and a permanent mural, inspired by and exploring our connection to nature, the pigeons and other birds that live along the cycle route. Walk through the tunnel leading off Easwald Bank up to the cycle path and enjoy an ascending mural of birds morphing towards bursting positivity of colour & words. A permanent Installation. #### Waulking to the Beat of the Sea

A modern interpretation of an old Renfrewshire waulking song, (about a woman who has lost her love to the sea and is asking for it to release him back to her) comprised of a series of drawings printed and installed via strips of paper 'graffiti transfers' on to Bridge 15 at Elderslie Old Road. The three women's images are installed on printed paper as a temporary exhibition. A recording of one of the Gaelic songs performed by the Inverclyde Waulking Group can be accessed by QR code link to your mobile phone as you pass under the bridge or as you stop to look at the artwork. #### Vista Di Ninfa

*Vista di Ninfa* by Sita Pieraccini was a series of prints inspired by looking at organic matter from the local biome under microscopes and presented in a small clearing on Courtshaw Hill in the Parkhill woods near Lochwinnoch. Surrounding a central tree were presented seven elemental prints. *Vista di Ninfa* drew on Sita's collaborative work with artist Jamie Wardrop in their live performance work, *Strange Loop*. In this piece, Sita sang open portals to worlds within worlds, led by the ever evolving, projected microscopic imagery co-created with the audience in a playful attempt to facilitate a reconnection to the magical continuity to all living organisms.



### **Outdoor Touring Work**

#### **Strawboys**

by Rob Heaslip Dance Company A vibrant and energetic outdoor pop-up performance. Featuring luminous straw dancers whirling to Balkan inspired beats, the work is a unique interpretation of the cultural tradition of 'the strawboys', also known as mummers, guisers, burdie boys, skekklers and wren boys; identified by their ornate straw masks while out rambling streets, fields, towns and parks, parading their merriment to the joy of onlookers.





#### **Cat-Sith**

by Ludic Acid Productions Something is prowling through the local streets and green spaces. Is it an errant endangered Scottish Wildcat, an ancient mythical highland spirit, or a modern vernacular cryptic perhaps? Join Sammy, cat catcher extraordinaire, as she tracks and stalks this elusive beast in an interactive, light hearted engrossing spectacle. Cat Sith is fusion of high paced acrobatic puppetry (drawing on Lion Dance and pantomime horse) and physical theatre. Performers :Lizzie Clapham, Rachel Still and Jonah Russell.

#### Terrific Tales of Lochwinnoch

local storyteller Anne Pitcher, takes us on a journey through the tales of Lochwinnoch, along with her mischievous puppets, curious sound makers and sing along songs. Childrens and Family performance.





#### Fèis Phàislig Ceilidh Trail

The Fèis Phàislig Ceilidh Trail performers, a group of 6 young traditional musicians, gave a relaxed acoustic performance at Courtshaw Hill, performing a selection of traditional songs and music relating to the changing landscape.

#### Tales Out of the Box

Storytelling inspired by Scotland's ever-changing landscape, featuring the great Celtic hero, Fionn McCoul and his Hunting Party and mythical tales from the time of the Great Caledonian Forest. Conjured out of the magical Kamishibai, the bicycle theatre box as told by Harriet Grindley of *Tales out of the Box*.



### **Special Events**

#### Cycle Powered Music Showcase

Located outside the Castle Semple Visitors Centre, the stage delivered an unusual showcase of local musicians. The small stage, which amplifies the music of up to 4 Musicians at a time, requires 5 bikes with cyclists riding them for the entire period on the event. Musicians included Silver Threads, (Evelyn Laurie, Neil Thomson and John McGee perform the songs of William Tannahill), Archie Collingridge Watt (singer-songwriter), Linzie Clark (singer-songwriter), Deep Fliff and Lochwinnoch band Scunnart.



### **Exhibitions**

#### Scope Outdoor Arts Exhibitions

Scope artist collective embraced the outdoors with a Pop-up, open air art exhibition presented along the cycle route. The creative display featured works of varying disciplines including painting, ceramics, textiles, kinetic sculptures and other art forms. Presented at Millarston Woodland and Kilbarchan Old Station platform during the Festival week.

#### Eco screen at Parkhill Woods

programme offered an eclectic mix of short films from Scottish and International film makers including *Mrs Pia* by Pachedu and Kevin Cameron, *Laymun* award-winning animation by Catherine Prouse and Hannah Quinn, *The Art of Weaving* by Jeremy Seifert, (Global Oneness, USA), *Black Pete* by Pachedu and Kevin Cameron, *Stealing Our Future* by ReMode.



#### Clouture by Gillian Steel

Clouture presented a PHD research project in progress that spotlights the potential for Scottish communities to challenge existing environmentally damaging clothing industry models, by conjuring locally appropriate future solutions. Ones that draw from local experiences, cultures, folklores, knowledge, and skills, using locally grown plants and fibres to meet clothing needs.

### Workshops

#### **ReMode Outdoor Craft Workshops**

ReMode presented a series of four outdoor crafts workshops which look at using local plants and undergrowth to inspire organic artistic pieces. Each workshop focuses on different skills, Botanical Printing, Natural Dyes, Block Printing and Botanical Stitch. Led by artists Gillian Steel, Keng Keng and Nikki Taylor.





#### **Paisley Circus** Workshops

Anyone can learn to unicycle! the opportunity to learn from the experts at Community Circus Paisley was provided thrghout the festival week, giving a crash course in how to mount, balance and ride as well as a chance to see the pros at work.

#### Gardening Workshop & **Nature Walk**

Froglife hosted a Wildlife Gardening Workshop to share skills for gardening to encourage wildlife followed by undertaking a guided nature walk to explore the site and find local Renfrewshire wildlife.



## **Cycling Events**

#### **Guided Bike Rides** including Women On Wheels

Guided trip along the festival route with trained bike ride leaders. Each ride stopped along the various exhibitions and interesting points along the route. Women on Wheels (SCIO) is a Glasgow based community cycling hub for women and provided a led ride specifically open to women and children



#### **DR Bike with Bike for Good**

The opportunity to bring your bike along to Dr Bike stall, provided by Bike for Good to have it looked over. At Dr Bike, bikes were checked over by a trained mechanic, who made any onthe-spot adjustments and fixes that need doing right there and then, free of charge.

## Some Outcomes

• The linking of Arts to Environmental awareness was recognised as an important part of the work of the festival and the outdoor arts commissions which were part of it.

• There was a change in thinking about what it was possible to do creatively outside, how to use our spaces differently, greenspaces that have been taken for granted have been given new value.

• Integrating cycling into how the public attend the Festival events, and seeing events powered by bikes or using bikes as part of the delivery of the arts work is pushing. boundaries and changing perceptions.

• By encouraging the audiences to discover the Festival events, the public could seek out events using the Route map or just discover the arts events while out for a walk or cycle rather than book in advance. Some events did have set times other were in location for many hours which gave a relaxed atmosphere and the public seemed to stay around chat to the artists and discuss the art and live work they had seen.
